Welcome to Parents School

This month, 65 people from the Romanian Union – the Banat Conference, the Moldova Conference, the Muntenia Conference, the Oltenia Conference, the Transylvania Nord Conference and the Transylvania South Conference, participated in the first national training for the implementation A new project "Parents School". This course was led by Simona Anca, Doctor in psycho-pedagogy.

Children's education is a passionate activity, a process in which both the

child who is educated and the adult who educates develop.

In the face of the task of educating our children we can meet with a difficult target for many families. In general, many question marks appear: "What is best for our son or daughter?" "What rules should we follow in order to have a healthy development?" "How will we manage to have a child who behaves well?" In addition, we can face concrete problems: "My son does not eat well", "How do I control anger crises?" "Do not listen to me..." etc. Being a mother or a father is not easy, because our instinct, our affection and our illusion are not always enough.

Education and the need for a school of parents

Many times, as parents we can feel lost. Only when we face the growth of our little ones we realize the difficulty of this process. We know that there are many doubts that can occur every day, we know that to educate a child, it is to educate a person in development, and

MEMORIZING BIBLE VERSES

Using Actions and the Body: Jump up verses

Supplies:

- a copy of the Bible verse for each child
- a red marker or yellow highlighter

Instructions:

- Highlight a different word on each copy of the verse if you have a large group. If you have a small group or family, some children may have more that one word highlighted. Also, in a large group, several children may have the same word.
- 2. Practice saying the memory verse together with all the children sitting on chairs or on the floor.
- 3. Have them say the verse together slowly, and have each child jump up when his/her word is said.

4. Run through the verse again, but now, have the child who has the highlighted word jump up and say his/her word at the right point in the verse.

Other ideas

 Have the children use a different response instead of jumping, such as raising their hand or holding up a placard with their word written on it.

SPECIAL NEED MINISTRIES

Disability categories: 4. Learning



Learning disabilities are often accompanied by emotional and behavioral problems. Disorders affect how children process what they see and hear. Learning disabilities you may encounter include ADD, ADHD, dyslexia, and academic skills disorders. These children try hard, but struggle to keep up with their peers because of problems with perception, memory, attention, and immaturity.


Learning disabilities are sometimes called hidden disabilities because children don't look "different"—the disabilities aren't obvious. Children with learning disabilities aren't likely to sit still for long periods of time or keep track of their belongings. It's helpful if volunteers learn to create and maintain schedules children can trust and become comfortable with. Surprises aren't always a good idea.

Teachers should steer clear of paper and pencils for these kids, give single-task instructions, and use constant repetition. Encourage your volunteers to always praise kids, no matter how small their efforts.

A ccording to Dr. Gary Chapman, author of The Five Love Languages, love can be expressed in five main ways. He calls these expressions love languages, and they include: Words of Affirmation, Quality Time, Receiving Gifts, Acts of Service, and Physical Touch. For each of us there is one expression of love that we find is most meaningful to us. Look at the following statements, and choose the one you think fits you best.

___ I feel especially loved when people express how grateful they are for me and for the simple, everyday things I do. (Words of Affirmation)

- I feel especially loved when a person gives me undivided attention and spends time alone with me. (Quality Time)
- ___ I feel especially loved by someone who brings me gifts and other tangible expressions of love. (Receiving Gifts)
- ___ I feel especially loved when someone pitches in to help me, perhaps by running errands or taking on my household chores. (Acts of Service)
- ___ I feel especially loved when someone expresses feelings for me through physical contact. (Physical Touch)

Which expression of love, or love language, do you "speak"? It's fascinating how God created each of us to experience love in a way that is special to us.

Project "Etiquette"

In the 333 churches that have children's Ministries coordinator we have over 7000 children.

There were made over 300 of Vacation Bible schools, attended by more than 16000 children of which 12000 children were non-adventist.

Over 170 evangelistic programs were made in churches after which 82 children were baptized.

One of the big projects was "ETI-QUETTE ".

During the school year, trained and accredited volunteers go and perform educational activities (seminar, Symposium, Forum) in schools. Hours of managing the classes and extra-curricular requirements are a perfect opportunity. The theme of the seminars is diverse and regarding to the civilized behavior; Professional orientation; Relationship with parents; Lifestyle, ethical-moral education; etc.)

The project has two parts: one that consists of managing the classes-meetings during the school year and the second part consists of organizing a one-week camp to participate in selected pupils based on the year's involvement but also teachers/ frames accompanying the group of pupils. The deployment is permanent in collaboration with the directors and the managers of the school-classes, of students ' classes. At the end of the year, 5 pupils from each participating class and a teacher/teaching staff will attend a training camp and special activities for one week.

During the camp, children will perform activities specific to the programs of the pathfinders and companions and the teachers participate in a team building activities and lifestyle seminars (CREATIVE ideas series; New Start).

Only this year have participated over 120 teachers and 3000 children in the camps prepared for them.

God's glory be in all the projects each of us.

"Yellow Flash" has been a mountain of emotions the whole week: happiness, anger, fury, sadness and her mother has always been there to either calm her down or to celebrate her joy in full. But her "Thank-You Card" was not for her mother - it was for her father, absent from her life most of the time and not very close to the family. When asked why, her answer was simple: "I loved mommy all week long, now it's time for daddy." Mom's sadness was quickly replaced by tears of joy at the end of the activity, when it was pointed out that the greatest treasure for a child are his parents and the little girl gleefully jumped in her arms.

Although rain poured down all week long and we had to stay inside most of the time, one lady always smiled and each day said that she was very optimistic and convinced that the weather was going to be fine. Nothing could beat her down so we just thought she was the "praying type", but we were so wrong. When the camp ended, she came to us and told her story: not a SDA member, nor has she ever been to a SDA church before, but she kept bringing her boy to different camps all summer long. But this was not the only surprise she had in store - looking at the construction site for the Youth Centre, her hand reached for the wallet and pulled out all the money



it contained. With dissapointment in her eyes, she said: "This is all the cash I have on me, but I want to come here next year and stay in that building over there. I will bring you all the money I have at home if I have to." It was about 200 Euro, considering that the camp price was about 35 Euro.

Maybe some bonds were strengthened, maybe some parents got a second chance to look at the relationship with their children, maybe they did not. But one thing we know for sure is that we saw a change. In the first day, all of the kids were shy and ashamed because of their parents being there. Saturday, there was nothing else but smiles on those little faces. The Youth Centre might be ready next year or might still be a site, but those small humans will return with their family.

New Opportunities

Adventurer Camp (non-Adventist) in the North Transylvania Conference

A wonderful time we had this year in the north part of the Conference. Exactly, in beautiful Maramures, Adi Dorgo, pastor and assistant of the youth director of the Conference, asked me to initiate a camp meeting with the non-Adventist children. Being interested by new opportunities to serve children, I accepted.

So, Adi Dorgo began with approximately 40 children. In the lands of Nanesti, a little country, not far by Sighetu Marmatiei city. There, he and his team spent 5 days to teach the children the value of God's Book and the role of prayer. Remember, we had children in the camp with no Bible culture. Five Games for a Rainy Day

Rain, though in itself a reason to step out with the kids for some water based activities can also be a deterrent especially if the children are not appropriately dressed. If you have been wondering what to do when kids get restless, here are five indoor game ideas that will surely cure boredom

1. Paper-bag skits

Divide the kids up in equal groups. Let each group choose a prepared paper bag filled with props, such as a spoon, toy, a straw, a sock, a ball and/or a book (these are just examples that can be improved). Give the groups 15 minutes to construct a skit with the received props. During this preparation, transform the room into a theater and let each group present their skit in front of the others.



- 2. Indoor hopscotch
 - Using masking tape, set up your hopscotch game on any floor surface, even carpet. (Painting tape is the best as it leaves no residue.) Form the nine connecting squares. Boxes 1-3 will be placed in a single line, one on top of the other. The next two boxes (4, 5) will be placed side-by-side, followed by a single box (6), two more boxes (7, 8) and the final half-circle "home" base (9). Next, choose a marker, such as a coin, stone or beanbag. The first player will throw the marker into square 1 without letting it bounce or touch the lines. If successful, the player will then hop — one foot on single squares and two feet on side-by-side squares — avoiding square #1. The player may rest on "home" before hopping back. On the way back, he or she picks up the marker on square #1 and, if successful (lands within the lines, hops or jumps with proper footing, doesn't

fall), takes another turn and throws it into square #2. When the player is unsuccessful, the next player takes a turn. Players resume their turns by throwing the marker on the last box played. The winner is the first player to throw the marker home (#9), and smoothly complete the whole course.



3. DIY balance beam/labyrinth While you have your masking tape out, why not make your own balance beam? We all know how much kids love walking in straight lines every chance they get. Put on some music, and one at a time the kids can take their turn walking one-foot-over-theother across the straight line of tape. Make the game more challenging by having the kids walk backwards or balance with one foot on the line. To be even more challenging you can create a labyrinth through which a child can go blindfolded guided by the group.



4. Indoor bowling

A great way to reuse water bottles (or you can purchase an indoor bowling set). Line 6-10 water bottles up at the end of your hall or living room. Place a line of duct tape at the starting line. Grab a medium-sized indoor ball and start bowling! If you want, keep score and give out trophies at the end. (Note: if you need to stabilize the water bottles or make the game more difficult, simply fill them up with some water. Don't forget to screw the tops on tightly!)





5. The listening game Show the kids several miscellaneous items. Have the children look at all the items, and then take them away. Next, use a blindfold one child to and than have them listen as you pick up an item and make sounds with it. Ask the child to guess which item made the sound. Examples of items might be a comb (run your fingers along it), a glass (gently tap it), a pencil (write on paper), shakers, sandpaper, wooden blocks rubbed together, a pot and spoon.





Ten ways to involve children in the sermon

- As you write your sermon, think about how the children will hear what you say and which points will be most relevant to them. Pray that the Holy Spirit will inspire you to find fresh and creative ways to involve children in your sermon. If you find it hard to be creative, ask your local children's ministries leaders to help you come up with different ideas. Please give at least two weeks' notice before your service if you are asking a busy person to help you.
- 2. Tell the children's story during the sermon. This can break up the long sermon time for children and give them something to listen out for. Otherwise they can often find it very hard to listen to a long sermon as they have usually learned that nothing else happens for the children in a church service once their story has finished.
- 3. Be creative about involving children in the theme of the service. If you are telling the story about Noah you could hide plastic animals in 7s and 2s around the church for the children to find. These could then be placed inside a large ark—a cardboard box would be fine! Gift-wrap objects that help to tell your sermon and invite the children to open them. One pastor places a surprise object in a special bag that he takes to the church each week. The children can't wait to help him open the bag during the sermon! Each week the object is chosen to help the

children learn how much God loves them.

- 4. Ask a teacher or scientist to involve the children in a science or nature experiment as an illustration during the sermon time.
- 5. Use attractive photographs to illustrate your sermon PowerPoint slides so that you keep the children's attention. Hide the picture of a small object in more than half the slides. You can choose an image that is relevant to the sermon theme, such as a stone, lamp, coin, etc. Ask the children look carefully at the pictures and count how many hidden objects they can find.
- 6. Create a simple worksheet that is linked to the sermon theme and give it to the children for them to complete during the sermon. This helps them to think about the sermon, and many children actually listen better when they are doing something else at the same time.
- 7. Just before the sermon hand out a small ball of play-dough to every child. Invite the children to model something that relates to the sermon or to make a scene from the Bible story. Display the models after the service and encourage the adults to talk to the children about what they made.
- 8. Give each child in your church a special Spiritual Memory box. This is a place where they can collect items that are spiritually significant to them. Each week choose a small and inexpensive object that has a link to your sermon, and

give one to each child as they leave the church. Make the connection between your message and the item very clear, and remember that under-sevens may find it hard to understand abstract meanings for objects. You could give out a large nail when talking about Jesus' death, a small piece of map or tiny compass when talking about how God gives us direction, a tiny smiley person when talking about joy, etc. Encourage the children to use the boxes during their own worships and family devotional time to remind them of God's loving care.

- 9. Give older children a piece of squared paper and a pencil and ask them to create a simple cross word or word search puzzle using the key words in your sermon, plus other words that they hear you use. Or ask them to make a word search using as many words as possible from your key texts. This helps them to concentrate on what you are saying and helps them to remember the important parts of your message.
- 10. Dress a few children as the characters in your chosen Bible story and help them to create tableau stories to illustrate the story. You could also give them cards with clearly written words for them to speak at the appropriate moment. Interview the children about how they would feel if they were the different characters, to add another dimension to the Bible story.
